## **Tapping into** their creative talent

TUNKU Abdul Rahman University College (TAR UC) staged a production, "Aduni" by the Department of English Studies at the Faculty of Social Science and Humanities

It was held from Aug 1 to 3 at TAR UC's Kuala Lumpur Main Campus.

This year's play, written by Malaysian poet Wong Phui Nam. is an adaptation of Medea, a Greek tragedy by Euripides.

The production was led by Darminaa Uthayakumar, a second year Diploma in Mass Communication student while Mohd Fadli Zakaria, a lecturer at FSSH's Department of English Studies, guided the team involved.

The TAR UC production team presented a different, modern-day take, which centres around a 16-year-old girl named Aduni who is misunderstood and discriminated against, and who tries to

redeem herself.

"It was indeed a valuable experience for me to be able to learn how to direct a play.

"After this, I intend to continue my journey in theatre and grow from there. If I am lucky enough, maybe this will become a fulfilling career," said Darminaa.

She said she was proud and honoured to be given the opportunity to lead the production, adding that it had not been an easy journey as there were many obstacles along the way.

The main objective was to expose the talented students to the world of production, especially to Malaysian writers such as Wong, said Mohd Fadli. He also teaches subjects such as Fundamentals of Acting and Characterisation.
