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Ng is first Malaysian to score a distinction for an ACCA paper

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KUALA LUMPUR: A Tunku Abdul Rahman University College (TAR UC) student did the World No.1 for a paper in the AcCA exam. Caroline Ng Yi Wye (pic) scored a distinc-tion in the "Strategic Business Leader" subject

for the accounting exam in December last yea

MCA President Datuk Seri Dr Wee Ka Siong congratulated Ng for obtaining the top prize in the subject and for being the first in Malaysia to have

in Malaysia to mave done so. Dr Wee said that TAR UC, set up by MCA, maintains tui-tion fees at an afforda-ble level, while still offering bioh-mailing et

offering high-quality education. "The success achieved by Caroline Ng and many other graduates in TAR UC is proof to those who have doubts about the commitment of the political party that founded this educational institution.

ing below the minimum wage in Malaysia, let's say there are about 100,000 of them. You need to nurture their talent and then their salary can double or triple. "You don't need to adjust the minimum

wage, and you wouldn't have to force the SMEs to immediately pay for the increase in wages," he told reporters yesterday. He also said the government should have

kept to their pledge to abolish tolls. "This government 'U-turns' on matters that

they should not, but does not reverse deci-sions when they should. "They should have U-turned on the flying car, and the free breakfast programmes in schools should have been reversed much ear-

"(But) they keep U-turning on the black shoe issue until people are confused," he said.

Meanwhile, on the announcement that the government will not sell off PLUS highways, Dr Wee said the government should not make it out to seem like the people were benefiting when in fact the toll concession has been extended for another 20 years.

extended for another 20 years. "I am extremely disappointed that the 18% discount' is based on a 20-year extension which the government did not initially reveal. "If you mention it, people will just curse and swear. We are not stupid – don't think people are stupid. It's something that people know how to calculate," he said.

On Wednesday, the government had con-firmed that they would not sell off PLUS high-ways but instead would slash 18% of its toll prices and extend its concession until 2058.



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
